The institution being an aided as well as running self-financedcourses does not get any non-salary financial aid/grant from the state or central government. Fee collection is the only majorsource of revenue/income generation for the institution. The other sources of funds for the college are schemes, grantsreceived from the University for the purchase of sports equipment and conducting workshops, seminars & conferences. Audited income and expenditure statement is available. After estimating the projected income for an academic year, theDirector sends it for approval to the Governing Body. Purchases are made with the recommendations of duly constituted purchasecommittee. The amounts withdrawn from the banks follow a systematic mechanism of obtaining the approval at variouslevels. If any expenditure is made beyond budget sanctioned, it gets ratified in a special meeting. The following are theoverheads of the institute:
